### **Application for the post of Outreach Coordinator**

Thank you for your request for the information pack for this post. Below you will find further information about the application process and about Holocaust Memorial Day Trust.

#### **Application Process**

We will select people to interview using the detailed information provided in your application form. It is therefore important you demonstrate your ability to undertake the role by providing evidence against the person specification (job description and person specification available to download from our website <http://www.hmd.org.uk/about/vacancies>).

The interview process will be a two-tiered process. The first interviews are scheduled to take place on 22 June 2010. Those candidates who are shortlisted from this will be invited to an interview on 28 June 2010 where they will be required to carry out a short presentation. All short-listed applicants will be notified of interviews by 5pm on 18 June 2010. If you do not receive an invitation to interview by the above time, regrettably, you should assume that you have not been successful on this occasion.

Deadline for applications is **12noon on 14 June 2010**. Please send your covering letter/email, completed application and monitoring form by email to [recruitment@hmd.org.uk](mailto:recruitment@hmd.org.uk). Please note we will **only** accept applications by email.

Each summer we announce an annual theme for HMD which provides a unified and clear message for HMD and free resources which will assist with organising a HMD event in communities or schools.


